

Told through letters, interviews and found texts, lovers of Fairlcough's *Bear Season* will be swept up in a sinister world of wellness gurus and mystery.



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

ADVENTURES IN NOT-KNOWING

S I ROSE through the school years, this conviction that **reading** was about **being right** rooted itself more and more deeply in my mind. In sixth form, while I was studying *Paradise Lost* for A-level, a teacher showed me an **essay** in which the American **literary critic** Stanley Fish sets out how Milton teaches us to be a 'fit reader' of his epic poem. Most of Fish's arguments were lost on me - indeed, it would have been a lot better if I had absorbed his reflections on the idea of **reading** as an **immersive experience** in which readers **collaborate** with the text to build **meaning** - but the idea of the fit reader stuck. This was what I would **strive** to be, I decided: a fit reader. Clever, conscientious and **correct**.



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

This Is Not A Cookbook

Roxana Manouchehri

This is not a cookbook uniquely blends memoir with food writing alongside evocative lithographic artwork created by the author. The vignettes in the book chronicle Manouchehri's childhood growing up in Tehran in the 80s following the Iranian Revolution, the profound influence of the women who surrounded her, and the legacy of memories handed down during wartime. Weaving early impressions of politics and repression with the comfort and familiarity of home, Manouchehri offers us a glimpse of a rich but fraught culture seen through the eyes of a young girl seeking to reconcile her roots through the conduit of food.

"The politics of Iranian cookery writing are often implicit and invoke memories of home and kinship. Diasporic cookbooks are not only about vivification of beloved childhood meals, but also about a kind of salvage, or a reattachment of self to the countries and communities left behind.
